## A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR By Rosalind Saunders

I never cease to be amazed at the wide variety of skills and expertise Lyric's volunteers bring to our organization. When thinking about volunteering for a theater company, the first things that most likely come to mind are artistic; important and wonderful things like directing, acting, music, dance, sets, costumes, props, lights, and sound. In my role as Board Chair, I spend the overwhelming majority of my Lyric time in meetings that have little to do with staging shows. For example, this week alone, I have had Lyric meetings and conversations about the roof, executive director search, capital campaign, and marketing. And every time, I am blown away by the other types of talents people bring to Lyric. We have architects, lawyers, accountants, and public relations and technology experts, just to name a few, who are guiding and advising us, and putting tremendous amounts of time into the smooth behind-the-scenes running of Lyric. We value and love all of our volunteers, but this is a special thanks to these folks, without whom Lyric would be a very different organization.

## THE ROLE OF TECHNICAL DIRECTOR FOR A LYRIC THEATRE PRODUCTION By Tom Dunn

Lyric Theatre is an organization rich with volunteer talent for its productions. Over the years, on the technical side of productions, an incredibly well distributed approach to getting things done has developed. Thus the role of the Technical Director (TD) is different than you might find at other theatres. Set Engineer and the Set Construction chair positions would often be handled by the TD.

At Lyric the TD's job is to work with all the technical committee chairs from Set Design, Engineering, Construction, Decorations and Props along with Sound, Lighting, etc. to ensure good communications and the timely solution of problems. The TD works directly for the Production Supervisor and works closely with the Artistic Team and the Stage Managers.

The actual work by the TD will vary from production to production based on the skills in the other areas. But, because the TD works with all the different teams, it is important that they understand those areas well. So a strong background in one or more technical areas is a big help.

Before the show moves into the Flynn, the TD would normally coordinate the communications of the show's designs and other plans with the Flynn staff. They would develop the load-in schedule and work with Set, Props and others to develop the detailed scene-change plans.

Once in the Flynn, the TD would work with the Stage Managers to coordinate the load-ins and run the technical rehearsals. This would include helping to block the movement of scenery and props. They are also responsible for making sure the backstage areas are set up for Costumes, Hair and Makeup.

The TD is usually not part of the Stage Crew but remains available to solve any problems that might come up during the run of the show.

The Technical Director plays a key role in the success of a Lyric show by allowing all the other teams to do what they do best. *Mamma Mia!* has so many talented people working on it that all I can hope is that the small role I'll be playing as TD will helps to make it all come together.

# MAHANA MAGIC FOUNDATION

Imagine you are having coffee with a friend and she tells you that she was just diagnosed with stage 4 breast cancer. You know she has two girls—Lilly 8 and Jamie 10. The 10-year-old is your daughter's best friend. Your friend, Jane, says "How do I tell my girls?! What am I going to do?! I don't know how to do this?!"

These are the questions our founder Greg Couture asked himself when he was diagnosed with stage 4 colon cancer. The hospital told Greg that they did not have a specific person or group that could help his girls. Greg created the Mahana Magic Foundation from seeing first-hand the needs to support his own children through his battle with cancer.

Mahana Magic Foundation is a local non-profit that supports children who have a parent or care giver with cancer. The Foundation's mission finds expression through a variety of initiatives including sponsorship of monthly programs such as art classes, ropes courses and sailing with Healing Winds of Vermont. Having these outings allows kids to meet other children going through similar experiences in a fun, relaxed setting. Building social connections with others going through similar challenges stems the tide of social isolation common to these circumstances and provides an outlet to express and process emotions. Additionally, we sponsor a week-long art camp at the Davis Studio and will be adding a cooking program at Healthy Living. We are constantly evolving and growing, ever looking for new initiatives that further our mission.

We have funded a Child Life Specialist at the UVM Medical Center for the past nine years. She holds support groups, offers advice on how to answer children's questions and gives them tours of the hospital.

New this year, the foundation is very excited to announce we will be awarding five \$1000 scholarships for graduating seniors. And, last month we sponsored our first Mahana Magic Winter Festival. This was open to all families directly or indirectly impacted by cancer. Activities included snow-shoeing, cross-country skiing, horse-drawn sleigh rides, dog-sled exhibition, food and games. The foundation is also proud to sponsor the Family Room at the Stowe Weekend of Hope and sponsor the American Cancer Society Relay for Life children's programs in St. Albans and St. Johnsbury.

#### Main Stage Show Proposal Criteria:

- Has not been produced by Lyric in the past ten years
- Has broad-based audience appeal
- Is appropriate for directors, cast and crew available to Lyric
- Has potential for substantial ticket sales
- Has artistic value

#### Written proposals should include:

- Names and qualifications of the Producer, Director, Choreographer and Music Director
- Synopsis of show
- History of the show (where and when it has been performed)
- General vision including cast size and mix, special talent needs and why it should be produced by Lyric Theatre Company
- A preliminary budget (past show budgets are available from the Lyric Office)
- Some general marketing ideas to promote the show

In putting a team together, Freda and I have been excited to bring on a strong mix of players who have done their roles before, folks who are new to role and even some who are learning/apprenticing along the way. This mix of tenured wisdom and new ideas has swirled together to create a fun, inspiring and creative vision for our show.

Tim Henderson has done an incredible job as Set Designer; he has already taken our vision from our heads, to paper, to a 3-D working model! Ann Vivian has come in to the team with a unique position—Set Colorist. It is Ann's job to take what Tim has created and bring it to life through color. Working off of this, our Costume team, led by Kerry Farrell has incorporated their costume palette into these conversations to make sure everything flows smoothly. ## FUN AND FUNNY AT GNOP SLEEPOVER By Carole Vasta Folley

Girls Nite Out Productions (GNOP) brings comedy front and center for their 2019 season with their selection of *The Sleepover—A Comedy of Marriage* by Vermont playwright Carole Vasta Folley. It opens November 6 at Main Street Landing's Black Box Theater.

The inspiration for *The Sleepover*, which won a Vermont Playwrights Award, is "comedy—pure and simple," says Vasta Folley. "The fodder of dysfunctional marriage, in the midst of inescapable second-rate couples' therapy, provides

the perfect elements for absurd situational and physical comedy."

The Sleepover tells the story of Mark and Susie, a married psychotherapist and life coach, who hold their first overnight marriage retreat. Arguing from the start, the two clumsily attempt to help five couples. Things go from bad to worse when Julie, who reluctantly attends the retreat with her long suffering husband, turns out to be Mark's former fiancée.

Vasta Folley adds, "This past year, I've reworked *The Sleepover*, enhancing the story and the fun quotient. It's been such a blast, I look forward to bringing it to the stage with GNOP!"
